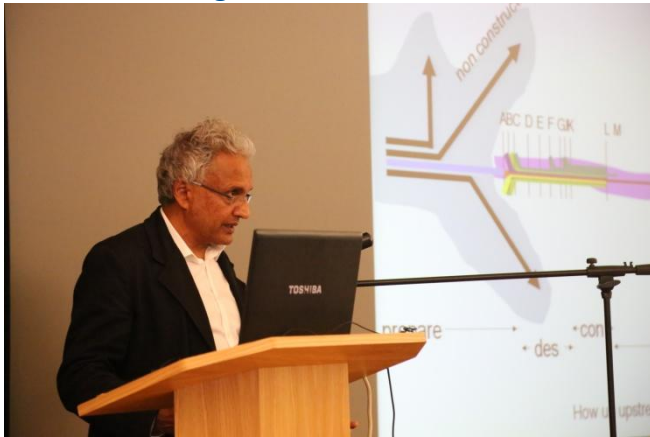




The IDBE@20 Big Discussion



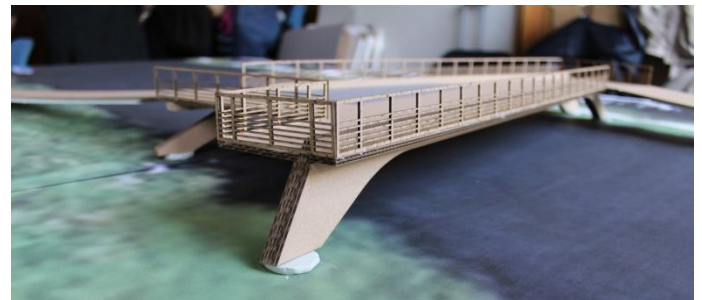
On 20th September 2014 the IDBE celebrated its 20th anniversary, at Wolfson and Newnham Colleges, Cambridge. Set up by the Arup Foundation in 1994 to foster interdisciplinary working, our panel discussion focused on whether we *have* become more interdisciplinary over the last 20 years, and where we should go from here. Our panellists were: representing the professions, Sunand Prasad, past President of the RIBA; representing the industry, Sophie Le Bourva, Arup Associate and alumna from the second IDBE cohort; and representing academia and training, Professor Peter Guthrie, Professor of Sustainable Development at Cambridge. The discussion and questions were excellently chaired by Pam Alexander, Chair of CABE at the Design Council; a Geography graduate from Cambridge with a portfolio of high-ranking posts in the civil service and industry, Pam added to the multi-disciplinary perspectives.

Welcome Cohort 21: September Course Week

Cohort 21, pictured at their matriculation ceremony at Wolfson College in September, were welcomed into the global IDBE family at the IDBE@20 event.



Arriving from Grenada, Pakistan, Qatar, Malta, the United States and Egypt (and the UK) they were able to add their own global experiences to the interdisciplinary team-work during the first studio project. They were tasked with designing a new bridge in Cambridge to connect pedestrians and cyclists to the new railway station being developed in North Cambridge. Although this was a real project with some existing proposals, the students were asked to bring creativity and innovation to the project, breaking with existing proposals if appropriate. The overarching aim of the project was to learn about how to communicate and work better together to develop a built environment project. At the end of the week the teams presented their concepts, justified their decisions and convinced a panel, helped by some fine model bridges!

Alumni news

Michael Parrett (cohort 17), a leading UK expert on the investigation of dampness and failures in buildings is receiving key industry recognition and honours for over 40 years of work in this area. Founder of the non-commercially affiliated Damp Diagnosis Consultancy (part of Michael Parrett Associates), Mike has been awarded Fellowship of the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors ([RICS](#)), in recognition of his considerable knowledge and experience in the spheres of land, property and construction. This honour was marked at a reception hosted by the RICS president at the institution's central London headquarters.

"Michael Parrett is an outstanding professional and we are delighted that the RICS is recognising the integrity and breadth of knowledge that he has brought to the surveying profession," say RICS fellows Mike Taylor and Martin Wade. The IDBE Masters Degree is accredited by the RICS under their project management pathway.

George Katsibokis and Weng Kong (cohort 17) have teamed up to found a new consultancy, *Project360 Ltd-Singapore*, dealing with project management and consulting services in the Singaporean built environment sector. They have already secured their first contract with a local contractor, acting as their consultants in organising their company structure and making their project management more effective. They also plan to act as BIM consultants, guiding local companies on how to adopt and embody BIM in their system, since the government has set a target for the industry to be BIM compliant by the end of 2015. In this framework Brian Lopez (also cohort 17) will offer his expertise in an informal way, as a friend and colleague. As a result George is relocating to Singapore with his wife.
